## Dairy award for Pembrokeshire farmer

At the Welsh Dairy Show held earlier this week, Mansel Raymond, of Jordanston Farm, Letterston, was present-ed with the Farmers' Union of Wales/HSBC award for the person who has made an out-

person who has made an out-standing contribution to the Welsh dairy industry Mansel, whose nomination was put forward for the award by the NFU in Wales, farms 3,400 acres in a family partnership which includes two dairy herds totalling 620 cows, plus young stock and a herd of beef cattle. They also have an extensive arable

acreage. In 1994, Mansel was elected as a representative to the Milk Marque area council, and five years later became an elected farmer director to Axis Milk Limited. Shortly after, he was chosen to sit on the Dairy Council and became a farmer director of First Milk Limited. Presently, he is NFU

Presently, he is NFU England and Wales Dairy Board chairman and chairman of the Copa-Cogeca dairy committee (representing numerous farming organisa-tions across Europe). He also sits on the EU Commission sits on the EU Commission advisory group for the sector and represents Welsh and English farmers on the UK Dairy Supply Chain Forum.

As chairman of the Copa - Cogeca dairy committee, he has lobbied on behalf of EU

dairy producers to ensure that the specific views of the dairy industry were taken into

active participant in meetings of the Dairy Coalition, set up last year, that has delivered a very effective and successful joint industry campaign with the aim of delivering fair milk prices for dairy farmers.

The coalition continues to meet regularly and earlier this year he wrote to the Welsh, Defra and Scottish ministers to request their support in put-ting pressure on milk buyers operating outside the volun-tary code of practice on dairy contracts

The present chairman of the Pembroke County branch of the NFU, he was, in 2005, awarded the MBE for services to Welsh agriculture.
